Principal's Page

We have reached the middle of the winter and again it is hard to believe that we are halfway through another school year. Soon students will be looking forward to signs of spring weather and we will also begin preparing for the upcoming state mandated assessments.

Back to the subject of winter. Occasionally I hear comments, "why didn't you cancel school today?" or the opposite - "the last storm wasn't even that bad and school was canceled." I thought I would write about winter weather, school delays and closings, and information we gather during this decision-making process. We all know dealing with Mother Nature isn't an exact science, from our experiences planning outside activities or trying to harvest a farm crop. Prior to these activities we look at the weather forecast, set our plans and then sometimes later end up thinking, "boy was that meteorologist wrong".

If it starts snowing during the school day, I usually have a *large handful of students* © eager to relay information to me about a neighboring school dismissing early. Gilmanton is surrounded by four school districts and many times we do not all make the same weather decision. Sometimes the storm is more north or south. Some schools have policies not to run partial days. Others may have a large number of families living on the bluffs. Schools with a contracted bus company may not be able to dismiss early because they might not have all their employees available for a midday bus route due to other contractual commitments. All these varied situations can impact all schools differently. Planning for predicted weather events like sub-zero temps, snowstorms, or freezing rain is tricky. The desired outcome is to make the best decision we can with the information at hand.

At Gilmanton, our choices are to have a normal school day, schedule a delayed start (or early release if applicable), or to cancel the school day altogether. On weather event days, by 5:30 am there is conversation between the school and snow plow drivers from the Town of Dover and Buffalo County. They give us an update on road conditions and let us know if they will have the roads plowed in time for bus routes. We digest this information, along with local weather forecasts. Another factor we consider is the arrival time of the storm and its predicted duration. Since each storm is unique, so is each situation.

We may run normal bus times if we feel we can get the students to school before the storm's intensity increases and it's duration isn't expected to be all day. When a storm starts earlier than predicted, we may dismiss later in the day than you would expect if the town and county plows still need to get that salt spread, or have not cleared the secondary roads yet.

The two hour delay. You may see we have a two hour delay and might wonder why, because the weather seems pretty good. The two hour delay allows time for snow cleanup on the secondary roads, driveways, and around the school buildings. On the flip side, you might see a two hour delay and wonder why we haven't cancelled. The delay also allows time to see how bad the storm is going to be. Often, if conditions deteriorate, a two hour delay is followed by a cancellation.

A majority of the time, Gilmanton's school delays and cancellations are not scheduled the previous night. With uncertain overnight weather patterns, mornings give better up-to-date information on the current weather and road conditions.

Don't we all love those sub-zero temps? Occasional dips in the mercury satisfy the ice fishers waiting to get their ice shanties on the lake. But for the rest of us, not so much. With regards to school cancellations, forethought is made as to the air temperature and wind chill. As a general rule, if the "real feel" gets down to the -30° range, the decision to cancel school will be weighed.

Families and Students in Transition

Do you know a student or family that may be in need of assistance? Many families in Wisconsin have found themselves to be families in transition without a place to call home. Our school district is committed to assisting all homeless students receive the best education possible. The McKinney-Vento Act defines homeless children and youth (twenty-one years of age and younger) as:

- Children and youth who lack a fixed, regular, and adequate nighttime residence, and includes children and youth who are:
 - sharing the housing of other persons due to loss of housing, economic hardship, or a similar reason (sometimes referred to as double-up);
 - living in motels, hotels, trailer parks, or camping grounds due to lack of alternative, adequate accommodations;
 - living in emergency or transitional shelters;
 - abandoned in hospitals; or
 - awaiting foster care placement.
- Children and youth who have a primary nighttime residence that is a public or private place not designated for, or ordinarily used as, a regular sleeping accommodation for human beings.
- Children and youth who are living in cars, parks, public spaces, abandoned buildings, substandard housing, bus or train stations, or similar settings.
- Migratory children who qualify as homeless because they are living in circumstances described above.

If you are personally aware of or are acquainted with any children who may qualify according to the above criteria,

All information will be kept confidential.

When you turn 18 all men are required to register with Selective Service.

Visit your local Post Office or www.sss.gov within 30 days of your 18th birthday. If you do not register you are breaking the law and cannot qualify for federal student grants or loans for college, job training benefits, and many state and federal jobs.
